

CURRICULUM

The Master of Public Health (MPH) is an accelerated, intensive one-year program designed for highly motivated students and professionals seeking to advance their careers in public health. The curriculum provides comprehensive exposure to critical issues shaping global public health, with students benefiting from research-informed teaching and direct engagement with public health practitioners through local community-based projects.

The program's structure ensures mastery of core competencies essential for addressing contemporary public health challenges. Students complete two semesters of rigorous coursework, followed by a three-month Applied Practical Experience (APE) during which they design and lead community-based health initiatives. This capstone experience culminates in the completion of an original thesis, allowing students to make a meaningful contribution to the field.
