'My first day at school' activities is organized by the municipal health directorate at different cluster of schools to educate and ensure children are physically fit and healthy to start the term. Ensign students got involved to educate school children on COVID-19, nutrition, hygienic measures and a lot more.





TRAINING ON SURVEILLANCE OUTBREAK RESPONSE MANAGEMENT AND ANALYSIS SYSTEM (SORMAS)

SORMAS (Surveillance Outbreak Response Management and Analysis System) is the digital solution for Health and eHealth surveillance for epidemics worldwide. It covers infectious diseases from COVID-19 to Ebola and provides digital infrastructure for timely management and control measures to verify disease cases. Mr. Gideon Kwarteng Acheampong, an alumni and a public health researcher at the Disease Surveillance department and Emergency Operations Center of the Ghana Health Services, engaged with Ensign students on the 26th of February, 2021, training them on SORMAS. This was a practical training and interactive session.



NATIONAL COVID-19 RESURGENCE AND OUTBREAK INVESTIGATIONS

This seminar took place on the 5th of March, 2021 to enable students expand on foundational competencies of applying epidemiological methods to the breadth of settings and situations in public health practice and interpretation of results of data analysis for public health, policy or practice. The guest speaker, Mr. Ernest Akyereko, a field epidemiologist from the Ghana Health Service (MPhil in Applied Epidemiology and Disease control/ MSc in Geo-information Science) provided on the ground information on the chronology of COVID-19 events in Ghana, the overall goal of the response, key principles of the response, the national strategic response (which was being overseen by the office of the president), some lessons learnt and challenges, as well as issues related to COVID-19 vaccination. Students actively participated in discussions on on-going pandemic issues on the ground. This educational interaction took place through zoom.



RAISING AWARENESS OF COVID-19 AMONGST SCHOOL CHILDREN IN THE LOWER MANYA KROBO MUNICIPALITY

The Ensign College of Public Health partnered with Rescue Volunteers (Ghana) and the Ghana Education Service on the 9th of April, 2021 to train 60 selected pupils from six junior high schools at Kpong in the Eastern Region to serve as agents of change and ambassadors in on-going efforts to help curb the spread of COVID-19 within schools and the community at large. HYGIENE (MHH), MAY 2021

In the third week of May 2021, the Ensign College of Public Health, the Ghana Education Service and the Ghana Health Service together with some NGOs embarked on a campaign to some selected junior and senior high schools in the Eastern region of Ghana to promote good menstrual hygiene, break the silence, raise awareness and change the negative social norms around MHH. The 5th Health2Go Barekuma Collaborative Community Development Project (BCCDP) Site Refresher training came off in March, 2021. The training of community volunteers was in two folds, an in-class training session followed by practical training session at the Barekese hospital and surrounding communities. The focus was on danger signs in pregnant women and neonates, RDT results reading and drug expiration test, fever and malaria review, tepid sponging, cough and pneumonia. CBAs were examined on the mentioned topics and their knowledge upgraded.

The 9th Health2GO Wawase Site Refresher training took place at the Ensign College of Public Health in April, 2021. The training and examination format for the CBAs was similar to that at the BCCDP area.



CENTER FOR GLOBAL SURGERY UPDATE

Over the last few months the Center for Global Surgery has been actively mopping up with data collection on the country-wide survey"Nationwide Assessment and Mapping of Breast and Cervical Cancer Services". Despite some administrative and jurisdictional challenges, the trained research assistants have been able to cover much of the country.

We continue to maintain ties with working partners and are currently connected with the Eastern Regional Health Directorate. Dr. Edward Kofi Sutherland, Site Director for West Africa, shared preliminary findings of the pilot study with the Eastern Regional Health Directorate at its 2020 Annual Performance Review meeting on the 18th of March, 2021. In attendance were district health directors, medical directors, hospital superintendents and hospital administrators within the Eastern Region.



He is Head of Port Health at the Kotoka International Airport and the Acting Manager of the Public Health Emergency Operation Center (PHEOC) at the Public Health Division of the Ghana Health Service. He is an active member of the National Public Health Rapid Response Team (PHRRT) and of the National Technical Coordinating Committee chaired by the Minister of Health. His work is mainly to provide COVID-19 response support through active risk assessment, national COVID-19 data management, managing travel related COVID-19 data and generating information through analysis to inform policy decision.



Lawrence is involved in conducting risk assessments at various ministries, departments and agencies (MDAs) and other national institutions like the Parliament of Ghana before the events are organized. He reviews various COVID-19 local outbreaks in schools, football clubs, churches and organizations (private and public) and subsequently provides recommendations to control these outbreaks.



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


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
